Guinea: Guinean private media body calls for lifting of sanction on Familia FM radio

The executive body of the Union of Private Radios and Televisions of Guinea (URTELGUI) condemned the suspension until further notice of the Familia FM community radio by the National Communication Council (CNC) and called for the lifting of the suspension, reports Guineenews website on 28 February.

The Guinean private media body reacted in this way to the suspension of the community radio after an extraordinary meeting at its HQ on 28 February. A statement read by a member of the executive, Ibrahim Diallo, said: "While URTELGUI regrets the decision by the National Communication Council (CNC) to suspend the Familia FM community radio, it condemned this attitude of the CNC and demands the immediate lifting of the sanction. It thus regarded the differences between the two sides at the Familia FM radio station as a "civil matter", said the URTELGUI.

In these conditions, URTELGUI added: "The law on communication has not been violated. It however urged the quarreling sides to resolve their differences amicably".

The private media body ended the statement by saying that it will continue its mediation efforts to find "an appropriate solution to the crisis".

Somalia: Somali government shuts down Mogadishu radio over "baseless report"

The Transitional Federal Government of Somalia has closed Radio Kulmiye, an independent station operating in Mogadishu.

Dozens of heavily armed government forces stormed the station and ordered it to be shut. The station's director, Abdullahi Gure, told the press the motive for the closure remains unclear.

The government accused the station of airing baseless report. The minister of information, Abdi Karim Hasan Jama, told the press in Mogadishu that Radio Kulmiye was closed after broadcasting baseless report that claimed government forces have defected to Al-Shabab. He said Radio Kulmiye has violated media law by airing inaccurate report.

The closure of the station comes at a time when the government is holding talks with independent media outlets in Mogadishu on the how the two sides could work together.

The media stakeholders discussed various topics on the media including the launch of a National Media Regulatory Body, which the minister welcomed.

Ivory Coast: BBC and RFI reportedly off air in Ivory Coast<http://blogs.rnw.nl/medianetwork/bbc-and-rfi-reportedly-off-air-in-ivory-coast>

Reports say that the BBC and Radio France International (RFI) have stopped broadcasting on FM today in Abidjan, Ivory Coast in what appears to be a renewed clampdown on foreign media.

However, the country's regulatory agency for television and radio has denied cutting off the stations. Felix Nanihio, the agency's secretary general, is quoted as saying "We aren't aware of any measure against these stations."

It's possible that the interruption may have been caused by fighting between rival groups, but the BBC and RFI use FM stations located in different parts of the city, making a simultaneous attack on them unlikely.

Arabic news channel Al Arabiya is reporting that a local radio station in Misurata, 125 miles east of Tripoli, has been bombed by military helicopters. It is unclear at this stage whether anyone has been injured.

The radio station has reportedly been broadcasting pro-freedom messages since Misurata fell into the hands of Libya's anti-government rebels last week. Reports suggest that the bombing began in the early hours of this morning, and that a military aircraft thought to have been part of the attack has been shot down by anti-Gaddafi rebels.

The Financial Times has an eye-witness report from Misurata, which says that an aircraft was shot

down while attempting to land at 4am.

Uganda: Kenya's Royal Media seeks radio licence in Uganda

Kenyan electronic media house Royal Media Services has applied for an FM broadcasting licence in Uganda. The company currently operates Citizen Television in Uganda although it has not started local programming. In Kenya, Royal Media Services operates Citizen TV - the most popular local station and Radio Citizen.

Godfrey Mutabazi, executive director of the Uganda Communications Commission (UCC), yesterday, 28 February 2011, called on the public in Uganda to provide any comments or opinion about the applicant within a period of two weeks, effective February 28, 2011, before it grants the company a licence.

"UCC shall grant the licence to the applicant if the commission, after the expiry of the above stated time, has received no opinion and / or comments in respect of the same," Mutabazi said in a media notice yesterday. [...]

The country currently has 35 operational television stations out of the 50 TV frequencies that have been issued, according to the industry regulator UCC. And there are 192 stations on air out of the 222 FM radio frequencies that have been issued by the commission. [...]

Guinea: Guinean leader makes new appointments at state-owned media

Guinean President Alpha Conde has carried out a restructuring in the Ministry of Information in a decree published on 1 March, reports privately-owned Guineenews website on 2 March.

The president made three new appointments in the RTG-Koloma [Guinean Radio-Television based at the Koloma suburb of the capital], the state-owned Horoya daily newspaper and the Boulbinet-based Guinean Radio-Television.

They are as follows:

Mr Mamadou Dia replaces Mr Ousmane Camara, the outgoing director-general of the Guinean Radio-Television based at the Koloma, whose reputation suffered following the differences between him and the director of the national radio, Kaba Conde, over the money given to journalists of the private media to cover the return of the president from his African Union summit.

Mariama Dubreka is appointed as the new head of the Horoya newspaper in the place of Hadja Madina.

Mr Alhassane Souare becomes the new head of the Boulbinet-based Guinean Radio-Television. The Guinean Publicity Office (GOP) also has a new director-general in the person of Frederick Loua. Some old hands like Emile Cherif, Oumar Bah and Mohamed Conde remain at their posts as secretary-general, principal private secretary and media advisor respectively at the Ministry of Information.

Uganda: Radio presenter suspended over critical reporthttp://www.ifex.org/uganda/2011/03/04/ssekimpi_suspended/

A presenter at Masaka-based Top Radio, Ssozi Lyazi Ssekimpi, is reported to have been suspended over a talk show which discussed electoral malpractice witnessed during recent presidential and parliamentary elections.

Ssekimpi, who joined Top Radio four years ago, has been working as an editor and presenter of the weekly talk show "Voice of the People", aired between 11am-1pm local time.

Ssekimpi's suspension was announced immediately after he appeared before the Masaka police on 28 February at 10am. The journalist was questioned over the 26 February edition of the talk show, which had discussed the 18 February election violence and other malpractice.

Human Rights Network for Journalists-Uganda (HRNJ-Uganda) has learnt that the programme specifically referred to the arrest of Masaka district returning officer Ephraim Tugume after he was accused of taking a bribe from a candidate who lost an election. [...]

Although the employer has the right to recruit and sack a worker, HRNJ-Uganda challenges the Top Radio management team investigating Ssekimpi to adhere to principles of justice, including by according him a fair hearing.

HRNJ-Uganda is also urging proprietors and managers of media houses to avoid succumbing to external pressure by ignoring media ethics and objective reporting.

Swaziland: Swazi government bans BBC live broadcast<http://blogs.rnw.nl/medianetwork/swazi-government-bans-bbc-live-broadcast-in-swaziland>

The government of Swaziland has banned the daily live transmission of BBC Focus on Africa programme after one of the news clips, broadcast through the English channel of the state radio, Swaziland Broadcasting and Information Services (SBIS), was critical of government.

The programme broadcast daily in the mornings, mid-day and evenings has been off air for the past week. The state radio has been running apologies to listeners of the programme for its absence, stating that it was due to technical problems.

However, Members of Parliament smelt a rat and confronted the Minister for Information Communications and Technology (ICT), Nelisiwe Shongwe, for answers. The Minister conceded in Parliament that the programme has been temporarily suspended. She said the government has taken a decision to censor the programme from now on and said it would be back on air soon. The Minister added that the programme had to be edited to ensure that whatever was being aired did not impact negatively on the people. She said people should understand that there were some pieces of information that could not just be sent to the people. She said they had to consider the impact that information would have.

MPs did not take kindly to the government's move and warned that it was dangerous as it was infringing on people's right to access information. One of the MPs, Robert Magongo, said what the government has done has the potential to spark a riot among the people. [...]

The government has not only banned the BBC programme but has also banned all state media from covering demonstrations and strikes currently taking place in the country. Parliament has also cautioned the government against that. [...]

Mozambique: Adventure-fantasy radio drama launches in Mozambique

Late last week saw the launch of Mozambique's first adventure-fantasy serial radio drama Madjuba: Quest for the Talisman. Madjuba is a 13-part radio drama available in Portuguese, Changaan, and Sena, initiated by UNESCO with support from SIDA, produced by CMFD (Community Media for Development) Productions. It will be distributed to community radio stations across the country. After decades of civil war, Mozambique adopted a democratic system with the first elections held in 1994. Although the country now has a progressive constitution which enshrines basic rights such as freedom of speech, freedom of association, and the right to information, in reality Mozambicans face high levels of corruption, lack of transparency from government bodies, and the fear of persecution for voicing opposition. Madjuba: Quest for the Talisman aims to show people that there are ways to initiate change.

Tale of adventure and fantasy

The drama follows the tale of a community that gathers nightly around the fire to hear a wise storyteller weave a tale of adventure and fantasy. Little do they know that the magic of the story has transported their stubborn neighbour Arlindo to a far off fantasy world where he has become the unwitting long-awaited hero, Chamwari. As Chamwari seeks the talisman that will transform the land, the village listeners realise that they too have the power to speak up and help make the changes in their community they want to see.

Madjuba was produced as part of UNESCO's Strengthening Local Development in Mozambique through Expanded Access to Information and Communication programme. "The drama is an entertaining look at how people can be part of local governance and development," says Noel Chicuecue of UNESCO.

Over the course of the story the hero, along with his allies, travel through different lands, each with a task or problem to overcome related to key governance issues: accountability/transparency, civic participation and the need for a strong civil society, freedom of expression, and political intolerance.

Inspired by Mozambican folklore

Many of the characters were inspired by Mozambican folklore - for example, the fallen King has characteristics of the Lion, and the dark force speaks and acts like the Mamba. The mystical Storyteller becomes the narrator, who helps move the story along, and explain events.

"Madjuba has a rich, three-dimensional soundscape and unfolds like a blockbuster feature film, while at the same time illustrating how ordinary people can work together to bring positive changes to their communities," says Deborah Walter, director of CMFD Productions.

The major protests last year in Mozambique's capital, Maputo, over public transport and bread prices, as well as international upheavals such as those taking place in Egypt, Tunisia and Libya show that citizens all over Africa are beginning to hold their governments to account. With its focus on community mobilisation and non-violent protest, the messages in Majuba: Quest for the Talisman are particularly relevant.

Large-scale production

The large-scale production involved over 50 local actors and recordings took place in Maputo and Beira. The script was drafted by scriptwriter Evaristo Abreu, who has over 25 years experience in the field of drama. Since 1984 he has directed and performed in about 100 conventional and community plays produced by the Tchova Xita Duma, Mutumbela Gogo and Mbêu theatre groups, as well as participated in festivals and conferences in Europe, Brazil, southern Africa and the Maghreb, including producing the Festival International de Teatro D'Agosto from 1999 to 2005. The drama is part of UNESCO's mission to contribute to the building of peace, the eradication of poverty, sustainable development and intercultural dialogue through education, the sciences, culture, communication and information.

Lybia: BBC Arabic staff attacked in Libya

Three members of the BBC Arabic team in Tripoli were detained and beaten while reporting on the situation in Libya. They were arrested on Monday, 7 March and taken to various barracks where they suffered repeated assaults, were masked and handcuffed, and were subjected to a mock execution.

Liliane Landor (Controller Languages, BBC Global News) said: "The BBC strongly condemns this abusive treatment of our journalists and calls on the Libyan government to ensure all media are able to report freely and are protected from persecution."

"The safety of our staff is our primary concern especially when they are working in such difficult circumstances and it is essential that journalists working for the BBC, or any media organisation, are allowed to report on the situation in Libya without fear of attack.

"Despite these attacks, the BBC will continue to cover the evolving story in Libya for our audiences both inside and outside the country."

Burundi: Burundi media council raps private radio's live programme

The National Communication Council (CNC) deplores the serious and unwarranted accusations brought against the institution of the head of state and other institutions of the republic on its live programme "Kabizi" broadcast on Radio Publique Africaine (RPA) on 8 and 9 March 2011. This was revealed in a CNC press communique published in the afternoon of on 9 March. The council reminds the radio that such comments are contrary to the stipulated press laws.

While recognizing the efforts being made by the programme's moderator to bring the radio guests back into line in cases of slip-ups, the CNC reminds media outlets which broadcast such programmes live on air of their responsibilities.

In the same communiqué, the chairman of the CNC, Mr Pierre Bambasi said the council will examine, in collaboration with the Burundi Press Observatory, media officials and professional associations, ways and means of giving a new direction to this manner of programmes in order to avoid possible blunders.

On the question as to whether the council met before releasing the communique, Mr Bambasi said that a full council meeting was unnecessary because it was only a matter of giving guidance, but not a issuing decision on the matter. For the case in point, he said, it is an action that relates to working relations and collaboration with the media.

According to Mr Bambasi, the preferred approach is of a participative nature where journalists themselves are invited to take responsibility. He added that there are times where, in case of emergencies, the council's executive members can meet and take a decision which will be validated by the entire council.

Ivory Coast: Radio station suspends programmes for fear of attacks by Gbagbo's forces

Al-Bayane, an Islamic radio station based in Cocody, a suburb of Abidjan, has suspended its normal programming for fear of being attacked by pro-Gbagbo forces.

The Media Foundation for West Africa (MFWA)'s correspondent reported that the action of the station followed a visit to the station by armed personnel of the pro-Gbagbo Defence and Security Forces (FDS) at about 1:46 am on March 7, 2011.

The correspondent said but for the timely intervention of the people in the community, the security personnel would have vandalised the station.

Al-Bayane is housed in a mosque complex and close to the Gulf Hotel, the seat of Alassane Ouattara, the internationally recognised President of Côte d'Ivoire.

On February 25, two mosques in the stronghold of Laurent Gbagbo in Youpougon, a neighbourhood of Abidjan, were burnt down allegedly by supporters of Gbagbo.

The radio station now airs only religious songs and Qu'ranic recitations.

Earlier on March 1, a group of FDS personnel in six vehicles stormed the premises of Le Patriot, but the newspaper's office was closed to protest what they described "intimidation" and "harassment" of pro-Ouattara newspapers by pro-Gbagbo forces.

In another development, the house of Karidioula David, a photographer of Le Quotidien, a pro-Gbagbo newspaper, was burnt down by unknown arsonists. No arrests have been made.

Mulama stated that the council remains committed to enhancing professionalism, pluralism and diversity of a free, responsible and economically vibrant media

The Media High Council (MHC), yesterday, granted licences to three new radio stations. The new radios - Huguka , Isangano and Ishingiro – will go on air before the end of the year.

Huguka radio station will be heard on 105.9 FM and 107.4 FM and is based in Muhanga District, Isangano is on 89.6 FM and is based in Karongi District while Ishingiro will be available on 107.5 FM and is located in Gicumbi District.

Huguka is owned by Association Huguka ASBL a local NGO based in Muhanga, Isangano is run by Isangano Association and Ishingiro is owned by ADEB Association.

The Coordinator of Huguka Association, Eugene Ndekezi, said their radio will specialise in promoting agriculture and economic development in Muhanga and other neighbouring areas. "We setup the radio station to advocate for better farming methods through advertising better agricultural practices and promoting community development in our area," he added.

Protails Nyamurinda the president of Isangano community radio ,said they will specialise in promoting good governance and socio-economic development of the community.

"Our radio will give the people an opportunity to discuss several issues that affect them," he explained.

Marie Claire Uzamukunda, the vice president of ADEB and Ishingiro radio station, emphasised that their programmes will be community-based.

"It will help the local community participate in development programmes of their community through exchanging information," she said.

Patrice Mulama the Executive Secretary of the MHC, stressed that, with the new radio stations on air, there are now 27 licensed radio stations in the country.

"With all active media outlets now conforming to licensing requirements, the level of professionalism in the media is boosted and thus quality of content is set to considerably improve," he stated.

Mulama advised the owners of the newly introduced radio stations to abide by the laws and regulations of the MHC in order to promote development and professionalism in the media industry.

Ghana: Ghana Broadcasting Corporation to sack 194 "illegal staff"http://news.xinhuanet.com/english2010/world/2011-03/12/c_13774685.htm

The state-run Ghana Broadcasting Corporation (GBC) announced here on Friday [11 March] that it had begun a process to identify and dismiss 194 illegal members of staff.

Director of GBC administration Hamidu Chodi told a staff meeting attended by Minister of Information John Akologo Tia that a committee had been set up to investigate the case and would come out with appropriate sanctions against all culprits.

The illegal staff members were allegedly employed through cronyism, nepotism and political influence.

After the meeting, Akologo Tia told Xinhua through telephone that he was surprised that almost 200 members of staff were illegally employed at such a sensitive state institution. He explained that the staff members were not directly on government's pay roll but were paid from the GBC's internally-generated fund such as adverts. "The organization usually takes overdrafts from the banks to pay these people and this eventually makes the corporation run into losses. Government then raises money to offset these bills," he disclosed, fuming that such activities were draining state coffers. The GBC, Ghana's only public broadcaster established in 1935 by the British colonial government, had in recent times been battling with financial losses and was sometimes unable to pay its bills as a result of alleged financial malfeasance. GBC's current indebtedness to other corporate bodies and banks was estimated at 1.2m cedis (827,600 U S dollars). GBC director-general William Ampem-Darko was last year sent on leave by a directive from the National Media Commission (NMC) to make way for investigations into some alleged financial improprieties.

Lybia: Libyan domestic radio again relayed on shortwave

After an absence of many years, Libyan state radio's programmes for domestic audiences are being relayed on shortwave (SW). In the past, such relays were mainly aimed at audiences outside Libya (in the rest of the Arab world and beyond). The relays ended more than a decade ago, as Mu'ammar al-Qadhafi reoriented his foreign policy away from the Arab world and towards Africa. The current relays may not be intended for reception abroad but be targeted at those areas of Libya where local mediumwave and FM transmitters have fallen under rebel control or have gone off the air altogether because of disruption caused by the current crisis. Despite the global decline in shortwave broadcasting over the last two decades, a number of Arab states continue to relay their domestic radio services on SW for audiences abroad.

Transmitters

The new Libyan relays are from a single SW transmitter, which has been heard since 6 March on either 7500 or 8500 kHz. Programming includes relays of domestic state radio and of the audio track of state TV. The transmitter on 7500/8500 kHz may be one that previously carried Libyan radio's external service, the Voice of Africa, as this is now only being heard on a single SW frequency (17725 kHz). A previously heard second frequency for Voice of Africa (21660 or 21695 kHz) has been silent since the appearance of the domestic service relays.

Both transmitters are believed to be at Sabratah, west of Tripoli.

The frequencies of 7500 and 8500 kHz would be suitable for transmitting from Sabratah to rebel-held areas of eastern Libya.

Lybia: Benghazi radio rap boosts morale

Two young Libyans whose rap music is broadcast to the front line by rebel Benghazi radio hope they are helping to maintain the morale of fighters outgunned by Muammar Gaddafi's forces. "Rap does not physically change things, but it invigorates the soul of people fighting and sends a message to all Libyans," said 16-year-old Imad Abbar, sitting perched on a paint can in the patio of his home in Benghazi.

Hamza Sisi agreed, and the lyrics - in Arabic - he wrote for their rap song "Shamat Al-Medina", or "Candles of the City", say all:

- * The candles of the city shine to tell the world what we want,
 - * The candles of the city won't rest and won't give up,
 - * The blood of the fighters is our own,
 - * We won't surrender until the regime falls.

"I have friends who fought in Benghazi and others currently on the front line and this pushed me to write the song as a sign of respect to them," the 22-year-old told AFP. "My words are reaching the front and encouraging people," said the shy young man dressed in a jacket, jeans and sneakers - a remarkably European look in a country cut off from the world for decades and where traditions run deep.

Although he is proud that his rap beats out of Benghazi's radio - one of the free radios working in the town since the uprising started in February - Hamza dismisses his contribution to the Libyan revolution as "not much", saying he would rather join the ranks of the rebels and battle against Gaddafi's troops. "I would fight but we are only two brothers and one is already on the front line so I have to stay home and take care of my family," he said with a glance at his father who was watching the interview from the doorway.

Hamza has been rapping since 2004 while Imad's first taste of the music was in Italy, where he lived a few years with his father, who had a band. The two met when Imad returned to Libya and settled in Benghazi, now the centre of the uprising against strongman Gaddafi. They record their songs in a small amateur studio, equipped with a keyboard and a computer, in Hamza's house. As for Libya's rap scene, Imad says there are many young men rapping in Benghazi, Tripoli and other cities, adding that they all keep in touch with each other but "few" are any good. He says rap is a relatively new phenomenon in Libya and that the regime is not thrilled at the talk-back tendencies of this music trend. "In the past, this was very difficult to do. Anyone who said anything against the regime spent the rest of his life in prison," said Imad. "The revolution expresses how we feel and that is what rap is about: expressing how you feel. And now we are not afraid."

Angola: New MW transmitter for Angola's Uige province

A mediumwave transmitter will be installed in northern Uige province this year, in order to expand the signal of the state-run Radio Nacional de Angola (RNA) broadcasting station to the whole provincial territory.

On the other hand, the official expressed satisfaction with the functioning of the provincial station, despite shortage of staff.

La voix des animateurs de la radio de proximité Bia FM, créée par la mairie d'Aboisso, devient de moins en moins audible sur les ondes. Et pour cause, ils crient famine parce qu'ils ne sont pas rémunérés. A les en croire deux catégories d'agents travaillent dans cette seconde radio de

proximité de la ville.

Ce sont, d'un côté, les travailleurs permanents et techniciens, et de l'autre, les animateurs, soit au total une trentaine de personnes. "Aucun animateur n'a un salaire mensuel ou une quelconque rémunération", témoigne l'un des animateurs sous le couvert de l'anonymat.

Et un autre de préciser ; "sur proposition du maire, les animateurs percevaient mille francs par heure d'émission. Mais, cela n'a duré que pendant trois mois. Nous sommes plus d'une vingtaine qui faisons marcher cette radio gratuitement", selon nos interlocuteurs, de nombreux collègues ont dû quitter Bia FM pour aller monnayer leur talent dans la seconde radio locale de la ville.

Ils accusent, à l'unanimité, le directeur de la radio, Bertin Assomon Anoh, d'être à la base de leurs souffrances. "Le directeur est rancunier. Il y a un déficit de communication, car il ne tient pas de réunions avec ses travailleurs. La radio meurt à petit feu.

Nous demandons son départ de la tête de cette radio", fulminent -ils. De son côté, le directeur se défend. "Ces animateurs savent qu'on n'arrive pas ici en tant qu'employés". A propos des réunions, Bertin Anoh explique qu'il ne peut tenir des réunions avec des collaborateurs extérieurs qui lui tiennent des propos désobligeants.

"Ils n'ont pas la radio comme activité principale. Ils doivent chercher des contrats avec des sponsors ou des partenaires, afin de bénéficier de cinquante pourcent (50%) de ce contrat. Je discute avec les permanents. Personne ne peut réclamer mon départ", déclare-t-il.

La mairie, promotrice de cette radio de proximité, devrait jeter constamment l'oeil sur ce qui se passe dans cette maison de communication pour éviter les frustrations et encourager les jeunes talents.

Le Conseil national de la communication (CNC) a initié une réunion de « concertation » à son siège du palais du 25 Août, hier jeudi 3 mars 2011. La rencontre visait à trouver une issue favorable à la crise qui secoue la radio communautaire Familia Fm, depuis le 4 février dernier suite au licenciement de Kaleb Kolié, directeur de l'information par Colette Baudais, directrice générale de ladite radio, a appris Guinéenews.

Joint au téléphone, Kaleb Kolié affirme que le nom Familia Fm ainsi que sa fréquence restent avec lui et qu'un agrément sera trouvé pour l'ONG ADFI (association pour le développement de la jeune fille) fondée par son épouse Tiguidanké Keïta.

« Le nom et la fréquence de Familia Fm restent avec moi (...) Le point de discorde était la paternité de l'ONG. Mais, une solution a pu être trouvée. Le ministère de l'Administration du territoire et de la décentralisation ainsi que le SACCO se sont engagés à œuvrer pour que ma femme ait son agrément. Et après, Familia fm sera transférée à cette ONG », se console-t-il.

A défaut de joindre Colette Baudais, nous avons contacté le directeur technique de Familia Fm, Laurent Koulemou. Selon lui, outre l'ONG AFEG et les équipements de la radio, les locaux (y compris le siège de Familia) reviennent à Mme Colette.

« Colette garde l'ONG et les équipements de la radio qu'elle a envoyés ainsi que le local qui abrite la radio. C'est elle qui a fait le contrat de bail des locaux (...) Mme Colette n'a pas voulu garder le nom de la radio parce qu'il y a eu beaucoup de problème avec ce nom. Elle souhaite trouver un autre nom et une autre fréquence. Et le CNC a promis de l'aider », s'enorgueillit-il.

Dans une déclaration faite le 25 février dernier, l'URTELGUI, estimant que le différent qui oppose

Kaleb à Colette est une « affaire civile », avait « exigé » la levée de la suspension de la radio Familia Fm « sans délai ».

Pour sa part, le directeur du bureau de presse du CNC, Ibrahima Sylla alias Ibra que nous avons joint au téléphone, a indiqué que la suspension provisoire de Familia Fm ne peut être levée tant qu'un nouveau nom et une nouvelle fréquence ne seront pas trouvés pour Colette Baudais.

Côte d'Ivoire: Déclaration des médias de proximité sur "la paix et la cohésion sociale"

Une déclaration sur le rôle des radios de proximité pour la paix, le maintien de la cohésion sociale et la résolution des conflits sera rendue publique vendredi à Abidjan au moment où "la Côte d'Ivoire semble s'enfoncer dans la violence du fait la crise postélectorale", a appris l'AIP de source officielle.

Selon Electoral Reform international services (ERIS) Côte d'Ivoire, cette déclaration qui aura lieu au cours d'une conférence de presse animée à son siège, fait suite à un atelier dont le thème était "Radios de proximité et conflits liés au processus électoral" tenu du 21 au 25 février à Accra, au Ghana.

Financé par le ministère Affaires étrangères britannique, cet atelier a été "consacré au journalisme en période de conflit électoral", précisent les responsables de l'ONG britannique spécialisée dans l'assistance électorale et le soutien aux démocraties émergentes, ajoutant que "les radios de proximité constituent un élément central de la cohésion sociale dans leurs localités".

"Elles sont au centre de la vie des communautés qui composent la nation ivoirienne. Elles peuvent non seulement éviter l'embrasement, mais participer de façon active au maintien de la paix dans cette période troublée", fait remarquer le directeur de projet d'ERIS Côte d'Ivoire, Karim Benard-Dende.

Par ailleurs, cette conférence de presse sera également le cadre pour l'ONG britannique de présenter la production de deux émissions, intitulées "Expressions citoyennes", en synergie par une vingtaine de radios de proximité et qui seront diffusées le 13 et 20 mars dans les 19 régions du pays.

Burkina Faso: CSC - Des médias étrangers sanctionnés

Extraits du communiqué de presse du Conseil supérieur de la communication, sur la 68e session ordinaire tenue le 10 mars dernier.

[...]Au titre des questions de régulation, les conseillers ont examiné des dossiers relatifs à "Radio Daandé Sahel" de Dori et à la radio "Proxima" de Bobo-Dioulasso, des médias dont le fonctionnement nécessitait un suivi particulier. Le Conseil a décidé d'une mise en demeure de la radio britannique BBC, après avoir entrepris en vain d'obtenir le renouvellement de l'autorisation d'exploitation arrivée à expiration depuis plusieurs années.

Quant à la radio Africa N°1, après une mise en demeure en date du 1er juin 2009 pour manquement à ses obligations conventionnelles et financières, le retrait de sa fréquence a été décidé par le Conseil. Le Conseil a, en outre, pris connaissance d'un dossier relatif à des manquements constatés dans des journaux et qui feront l'objet d'une audition. Les conseillers ont également examiné des plaintes de citoyens contre des médias, accusés d'acharnement et de non-respect de l'équilibre et du pluralisme de l'information. La question des SOS lancés par les malades en état d'indigence dans la presse a été aussi un point de préoccupation des conseillers qui invitent les organes de presse à apprécier les cas à la lumière des règles de dignité et de droit à l'image avant diffusion des appels à l'aide.
