In their bid to boost information and communication technology at the grassroots level, ActionAid-The Gambia is on the verge of setting up a community radio station.

This was revealed by the institution's coordinator of Information and Communication Technology, Mrs. Marie Mendy while addressing students from the University of The Gambia at the BPMRU complex in Kanifing. She said her company has been supporting existing community radio stations in various forms to enable them disseminate accurate and timely information to the communities they are serving. She said ActionAid is poised to revitalize multi-media video halls for rural communities to enhance their learning. "The equipment has been bought and the installation would soon commence," she said.

RDC: Nord Kivu, suspension de ses émissions pour cause d'insécurité

Delphin Yenga Yenga, directeur de la RTC (Radiotélévision LA COLOMBE), station de Rutshuru, chef-lieu du territoire du même nom, situé à 72 Km de Goma, dans la Province du Nord-Kivu a décidé, dimanche 29 janvier 2006, de suspendre la diffusion des émissions de sa radio pour des raisons d'insécurité généralisée.

En effet, dans la nuit du 24 janvier 2006, des militaires insurgés non autrement identifiés se sont introduits, dans les locaux de la RTC et ont emporté un ordinateur pentium 2, 2 téléphones portables de marque Nokia et 4 dictaphones. Quelques temps après, ces mêmes militaires se sont rendus au Guest house loué par la radio pour quatre journalistes qui venaient de Goma et ont pillé toute la logistique de cuisine et les valises de ces journalistes. Craignant pour leurs vies, ces journalistes s'étaient d'abord réfugiés dans la paroisse de Rutshuru avant de gagner Goma. Cette situation d'insécurité généralisée fait suite aux affrontements armés, survenus depuis le 20 janvier 2006, entre les militaires de la 5ème brigade et les éléments dissidents de la 12ème et 83ème brigades partisans du général déchu Laurent Nkunda Batware.

La RTC, propriété de M. Serufuli Ngayabaseka, gouverneur de Province, est la seule radio qui émet à Rutshuru. Elle prend le relais de sa station provinciale émettant à Goma ainsi que celui de RFI (Radio France Internationale).

DR Congo: Radio Suspends Broadcasts, Citing Threats

The Radio and Television La Colombe [RTC] based in Goma in Nord-Kivu [eastern DR Congo] has just suspended transmissions from its Rutshuru [north of Goma] branch.

According to its director, Mr Yenga Yenga, since the clashes between the integrated 5th Brigade and the dissidents in the district, its journalists have been receiving threats and intimidation from men in uniforms.

Still according to the same source, the RTC Rutshuru was looted by unidentified elements two days ago. The event was confirmed by the station director.

Kenya: Lancement d'une première antenne de radio chinoise à l'étranger

La Chine a lancé vendredi dans la capitale kenyane Nairobi sa première antenne de radio émettant en dehors du territoire chinois, qui diffusera des programmes en chinois, anglais et kiswahili, ont annoncé des responsables cités par l'Afp.

Radio Chine Internationale (Cri), radio d'Etat, proposera 19 heures de programmes par jour en chinois, anglais et en kiswahili - langue africaine très répandue en Afrique de l'Est - aux quelque 3 millions d'habitants de Nairobi. «En écoutant nos programmes, les auditeurs pourront connaître les derniers développements dans la construction économique, le développement social et de la vie culturelle de la Chine», a déclaré le directeur général de la Cri, Wang Gengnian, au cours de la première émission diffusée au Kenya.

Les premières formations organisées dans le cadre du programme de coopération Radio Lucie, se dérouleront au printemps prochain à Bamako (Mali) et Dakar (Sénégal). Elles seront placées sous la conduite de l'association radiosansfrontiere.org, co-fondatrice de Radio Lucie.

Sénégal: A propos du nouvel organe de régulation de l'AV

Le Sénégal s'est doté d'une loi et a mis en place un nouvel organe pour réguler l'audiovisuel dans ce sens répressif que n'a jamais eu l'ancien Haut conseil de l'audiovisuel. Une disposition juridique qui a suscité la réaction navrée des organisations de défense de la liberté de presse comme Reporters sans frontières (Rsf) qui considère ce texte comme «liberticide» et, pour cette raison, implore le président de la République de ne pas le promulguer.

Cette loi, écrit Rsf, est «mal rédigée en plus d'être floue et trop gratuite». Pire, elle veut faire de la presse «une marionnette de l'Etat». On sait ce qu'en pensent d'autres professionnels de l'information sénégalais dont le point de vue sur cette question ne saurait ni ne devrait souffrir d'aucune suspicion de parti-pris ni de subjectivisme.

Uganda: Police Arrest Four Radio Unity Journalists

The police in Lira arrested four Radio Unity journalists for allegedly airing programmes and uttering statements which discouraged people in the north from attending President Yoweri Museveni's campaign rallies on Wednesday.

The four journalists are: Mr Joe Orech, the Programme presenter, Mr Lawrence Akena, the Assistant Editor, Mr Paul Odongo, the News Editor and Mr Jimmy Owulo, the Radio Managing Director.

The President, during a northern region tour, visited Lira district on Thursday. But before his visit, Orech, during his Yabwongu (eye opener) talk show, allegedly urged the people not to attend Museveni's rallies because his delegation was infected with meningitis and could easily transmit it to the locals during his campaigns.

He allegedly said Museveni 's delegation had visited Karamoja and Moroto, areas said to be infested with Meningitis.

"Let us die of the war but not meningitis," he said.

"Museveni is bringing us meningitis. Do not attend his rally," a police officer quoted the presenter to have said.

The Lira Police Commander, Mr Taire Idwege, said Radio Unity has been airing programmes likely to incite violence during this sensitive election period.

"This is a sensitive period where the country is having elections under multiparty system of governance. We have directed the investigation department to ensure that these peoples' programming is moderated in a professional manner," Idwege said.

"The police have opened up a file against this radio station and its findings will be forwarded to the Media Council in Kampala for disciplinary actions."

Idwege said the army arrested the journalists after failing to respond to the police summons. "We called them but they instead went into hiding. What they are doing is very bad. They recently aired a programme on cattle rustling that led to tribal misunderstanding here," he said.

However, the radio Managing Director told Daily Monitor at Lira police station that his radio was being victimised.

"Our competitors are trying to fight us through the police. We were voted the best radio in the northern region by Rupiny newspaper readers last year," he said.

Benin: Trans World Radio completes new masts

The TWR shortwave and mediumwave transmitting towers in Benin have been completed, along with the foundation, main floor, and part of the top floor of the transmitter building. This new transmitting site will soon reach Benin, Togo, and parts of Nigeria, Ghana, Mauritania, Algeria, Mali, Niger, and Burkina Faso with the Good News of Jesus Christ. The station will provide opportunities for broadcasting up to 12 new languages within the first five years.

Currently, many FM radio stations broadcast in towns and cities in west and central Africa.

However, more than 60 per cent of the population lives in rural areas where FM signals cannot reach. The majority of these people groups are Muslim and either nomadic or semi-nomadic, making it difficult to reach them on a regular basis. Programmes will be provided through TWR's studios in Cote d'Ivoire and through several of TWR's Partner ministries in West Africa.

Guinea: RFI to start Guinea FM broadcasts "soon"

Radio France Internationale (RFI) will in the near future begin broadcasting in FM throughout Guinea like it does in other countries in the subregion. A source at the Ministry of Information disclosed this to Guineenews.

For this reason, a technical team of this global radio is expected in Conakry this week with the aim of "localizing" the areas for the installation of the equipment pieces. "The issue is well advanced and at this pace RFI will be able to broadcast on FM in Guinea within the next two or three months", he explained.

All that remains, before Guineans can begin to taste the early fruits of the liberalization of the airwaves "which is progressing slowly" is a matter of formalities. The RFI has to sign an authorization agreement with the Guinean state through the Ministry of Information. A second agreement has also to be signed with the General HQ of RTG [Guinean Radio and TV] whose masts the international radio will use in the cities such as Conakry, Labe, Kankan and N'Zerekore. This was discussed during the first visit of this radio's senior officer to Guinea some months ago.

The BBC, whose application is said to have reached an advanced stage than those of [Gabon's] Africa No 1, the Voice of America or even the Mano River Union radio, is also said to be interested in Guinea.

The decree on liberalization, which was much expected both by Guineans and the international community, came out on 20 August 2005, at a time when some developing countries such as Mali had gone beyond the euphoria mark. The laws stated that "foreign radio stations should sign an

establishment

agreement with the Ministry of Information acting on behalf of the government".

According to the decree, "no radio station (commercial or community) should identify itself with a religion, region or political party" in Guinea.

Le paysage médiatique en République démocratique du Congo est composé de chaînes de radio et de télévision, aussi bien publiques que privées.

Avec une chaîne de radio et de télévision dont elle va se doter bientôt, l'Université de Kinshasa (Unikin) va faire entendre sa voix. Ce sera une première dans le secteur de l'enseignement supérieur et universitaire en Rd Congo.

Une tour métallique sera bientôt érigée à l'Université de Kinshasa (Unikin). Elle servira à l'installation des antennes de la radio et de la télévision dans cette institution universitaire. Ces précisions sont contenues dans un communiqué signé par le doyen de la faculté des lettres et sciences humaines de l'Unikin, le professeur Willy Bongo-Pasi Moke Sangol, qui invite les constructeurs intéressés à souscrire à cette opération. Celle-ci revêt un intérêt particulier pour le département de formation des communicateurs.

Afrique : Concours Talk-shows radio pour construire la paix: Annonce des prix

Lancé au mois d'avril 2005 par Radio for Peacebuilding, Africa (RFPA), le « Concours Talk-shows radio pour la construction de la paix » était destiné à un groupe choisi d'animateurs de débats radio diffusés en Afrique subsaharienne. L'objectif du concours était d'encourager les meilleurs exemples de talk-shows africains : ceux qui gèrent les questions controversées ou les conflits violents de manière constructive, et qui fournissent aux auditeurs des raisons d'espérer. Ces problématiques ont notamment été envisagées lors d'un atelier qui a réuni cette année au Burundi, vingt et un animateurs de talk-shows radio provenant de pays d'Afrique subsaharienne.

RFPA a décidé de récompenser trois émissions (présentées sur le site de RFPA), toutes classées dans la catégorie «tables rondes»:

1. « The Breakfast Show » Bill Odidi (Kenya Broadcasting Corporation, Kenya), a remporté le prix du meilleur programme.
2. « West Nile we want » David Rupiny (Radio Pacis, Ouganda), reçoit un prix d'encouragement.
3. « Mosaïque » Gérard Nzohabona (Radio Isanganiro) reçoit également un prix d'encouragement.

La première émission s'est vue décerner un prix de 1000 euros et les deux autres ont reçu chacune un prix d'encouragement de 500 euros. Les émissions concourant dans les deux autres catégories (phone-in et face à face) ne semblaient pas remplir les critères exigés.

Africa: Radio Talkshows for Peacebuilding Competition, Prize announcement

Launched in April 2005 by Radio for Peacebuilding, Africa (RPFA), the "Radio Talkshows for Peacebuilding competition" was designed for a selected group of radio talkshow hosts broadcasting in sub-Saharan Africa. The idea was to encourage the best examples of African talkshows: those which deal positively with contentious issues or violent situations, and which leave the audience with reason to hope rather than to despair. The ideas were explored during a workshop of 21 sub-Saharan African radio talkshow hosts which took place in Burundi in 2005.

RPFA has decided to reward three programmes (presented on the RPFA website) with one prize of

Euro 1,000 in the 'round table' category, and two 'encouragement prizes' of Euro 500 each. We don't feel that any of the programmes submitted in the other two categories (phone-in and face to face) reach the required standard.

1. « The Breakfast Show » Bill Odidi (Kenya Broadcasting Corporation, Kenya), won the prize for the best programme.
2. « West Nile we want » David Rupiny (Radio Pacis, Uganda), receives an 'encouragement prize'.
3. « Mosaïque » Gérard Nzohabona (Radio Isanganiro, Burundi), also receives an 'encouragement prize'.

Uganda: New radio network trains up to 200 journalists

An on-going series of one-week journalism courses will include as many as 200 Ugandan radio journalists. The Uganda Radio Network, which launched on November 1, is training the journalists. The training courses cover basic and advanced reporting and editing skills. The U.K.-based Institute for War and Peace Reporting (IWPR) launched the radio network with two purposes: to provide stories and sound bites to radio stations across the country, and to provide quality training to radio journalists.

A consortium of European countries including Belgium, Denmark, Great Britain and several Scandinavian countries are sponsoring the program.

Each one-week training session includes up to 10 participants. So far, nearly 100 journalists have participated since the launch of the network. IWPR also produced a handbook for the advanced radio course.

Ethiopia licenses first private commercial radio operators

Some seven-and-a-half years after parliament passed a bill allowing private radio and television, Ethiopian authorities have finally granted licences to two private commercial FM radio operators, local press reports have said today. The first licences were given by the state Ethiopian Broadcasting Authority (EBA) to Zami Public Connections (ZPC), and Tisae Fine Arts & Adei Promotion.

The Broadcasting Authority had short-listed four individuals and companies from among 16 applicants. Main criteria were finance, technical facilities, programme standards, experience, schedules and staff training, according to Desta Tesfaye, Deputy Director of EBA.

Joint owners of the ZPC are Mimi Sebhatu, veteran radio announcer and commentator who had worked with the Amharic language service of the Voice of America (VOA), and Zerihun Teshome, general manager of the Amharic language weekly, Iftin. They also own the weekly Iftin.

Owners of Tisae Fine Arts & Adei Promotion are Abebe Balcha and associates, who currently run a weekly comedy hour radio show, "Chewata", on state FM 97.1 Radio.

Zimbabwe: VOP remand hearing postponed to end of month

In Zimbabwe, the remand hearing of the six trustees of Voice of the People (VOP), due to take place yesterday has been postponed to 28 February since the prosecution was not ready with its case. The State also dropped the weekly police reporting condition, which the trustees were ordered to adhere to when they were arrested at the end of January. The trustees are being charged with broadcasting without a licence, which carries a potential two-year prison penalty. They deny the charge, as the transmissions come from the Radio Netherlands Madagascar relay station.
